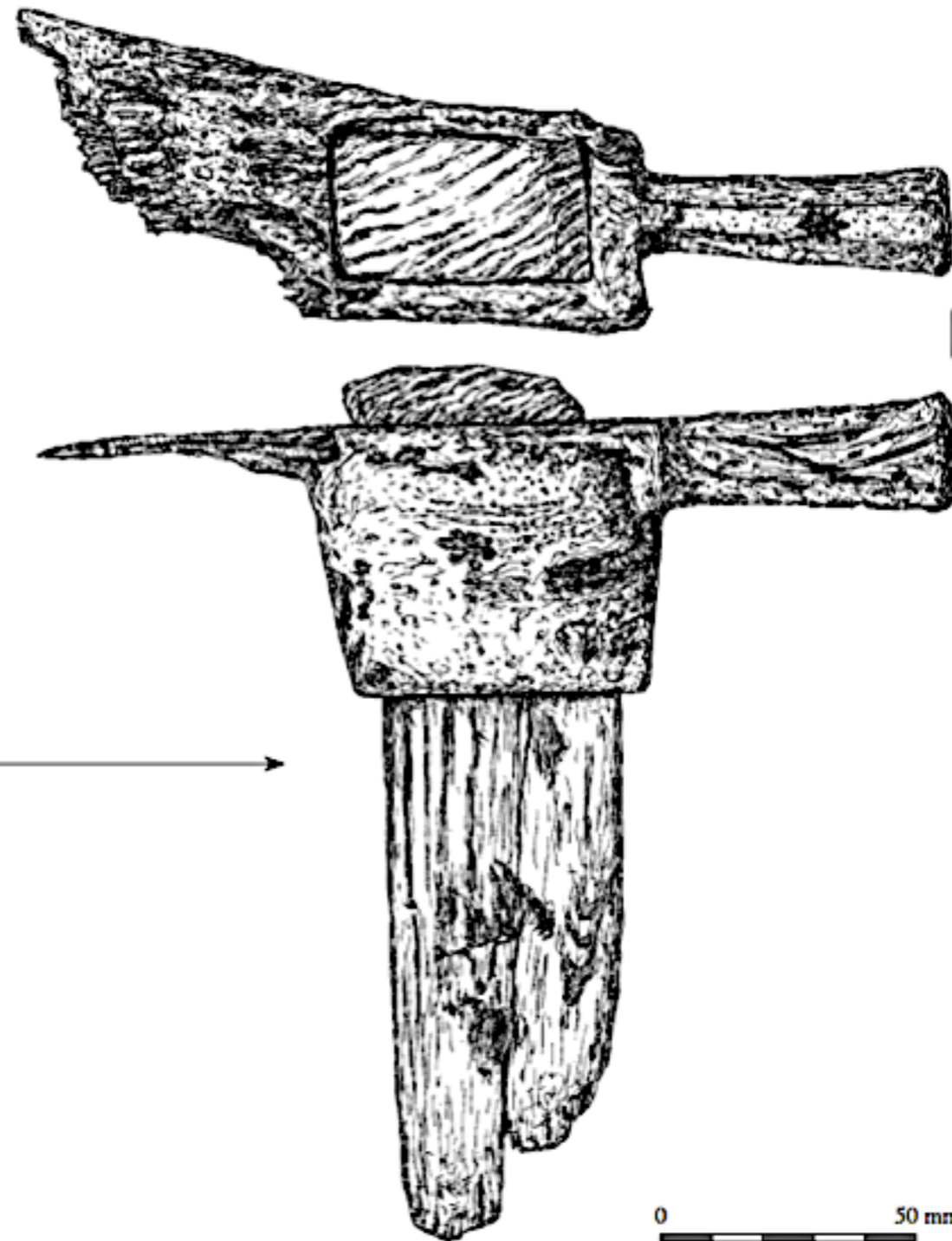

Highly corroded adze with a broken blade and
part of a handle remaining in the eye. The cheek
is rectangular in section. On the side opposite
to the blade there is an octagonal poll.

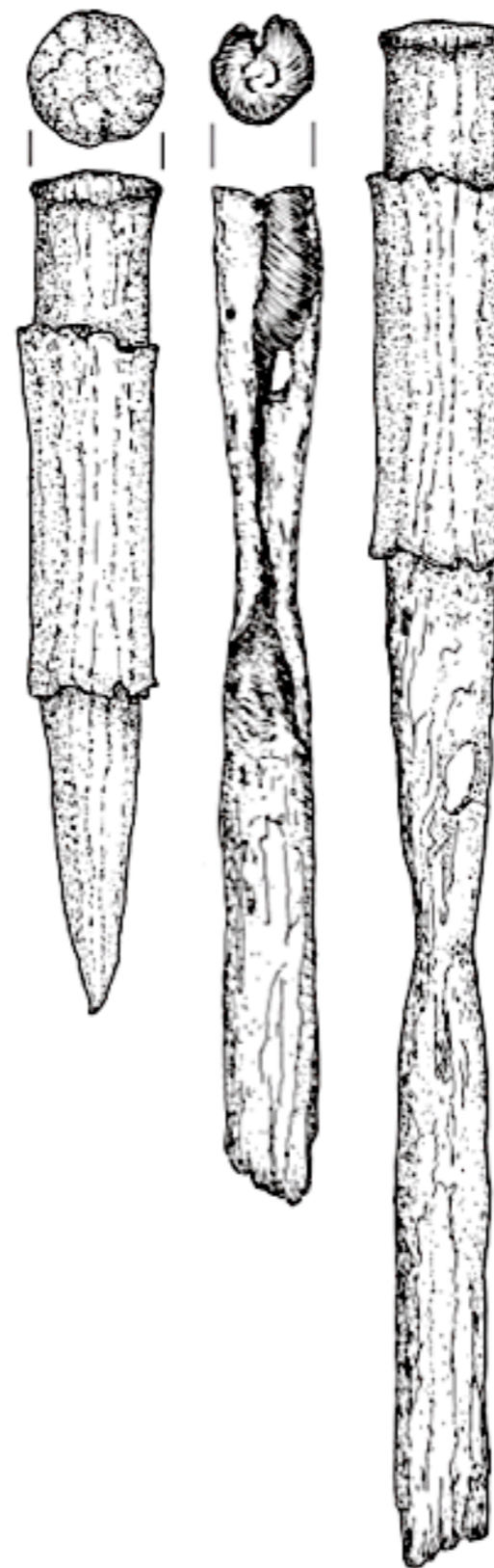

Site location / Lokalizacja: 23P1.

Dimensions / Wymiary: length / długość 340 mm, diameter / średnica 30 mm.

Wedge-shaped tool, forged from a single piece of metal, fitted to a wooden handle. The blade is 20mm wide. The 70-mm-long handle fits inside the chisel's conical metal sleeve.

Narzędzie w kształcie klina odkute z jednego kawałka metalu, osadzone w drewnianej rękojeści. Ostrze szerokie na 20 mm. Trzonek o długości 70 mm zamocowany w stożkowym uchwycie metalowego dłuta.

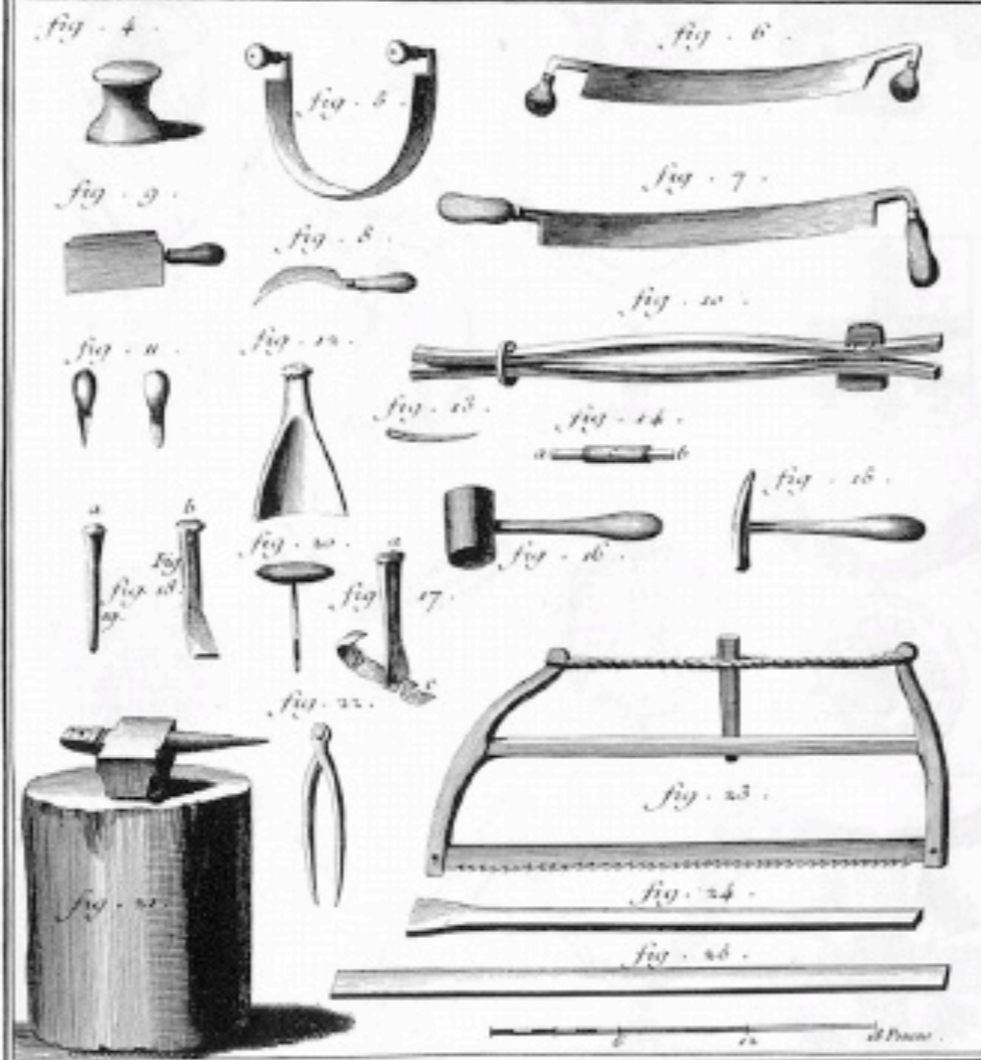
